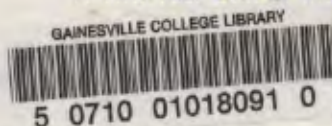

It is my desire that the Senate's study of the assessment evaluation process be broadly-based and that it reflect the comprehensive thinking of the people who will be touched by the process in the years ahead.

Those adjustments are addressed in an attached letter from Rich White, current Chairman of the Foundation, which went out to all members of the Century Club. FROM THE DRAMA DEPARTMENT

It is as predictable as fried chicken on Wednesdays in the Student Center. Both academic and non-academic audiences avoid our "serious" shows the same way students avoid Mr. Cabell's Speech class. Ironically, we do some of our best work in these oft-avoided offerings.

Why do students avoid exposure to these shows? Perhaps one answer is the expectation of a large portion of our audiences, especially students, that theatre is only an evening's diversion, that the only function of theatre is to entertain. If we can't laugh and have a good time, why go?

One of the theatre's objectives is to teach that we can and should find enjoyment in the exploration of ideas, in the pursuit of enlightenment. As you well know, this is not an easy thing to teach.

Terra Nova, by Ted Tally, was first presented by the Yale School of Drama and subsequently in major regional theatres throughout the United States. Small colleges have generally avoided the production of this play probably because of the risk it represents.

Please help us by challenging your students to find enjoyment in exploring theatre as a reminder that a culture is not to be judged by its material accomplishments alone but also by the aspirations and ideals that motivate conduct. Terra Nova opens February 21 and runs through March 4. Students and faculty are admitted free with I.D. but reservations are required. Call 535-6206.

First, I would like to thank you for your generous support of the Gainesville College Foundation through your membership in The Century Club. Your contributions to the Foundation have helped this year to:


- \* Provide financial assistance totalling \$136,360 which assisted 203 students in acquiring a quality education, and
