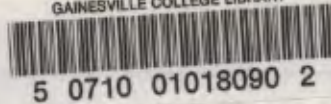

FROM THE PRESIDENT

I appreciate the leadership of Heyward Gnann and other members of the faculty and staff who assisted with the Foundation luncheon on Wednesday. Mrs. Phelps and her staff did their usual good job. The participation which almost exhausted the food supply was appreciated. We were especially pleased to have a number of our retirees on campus with us. We appreciate Dr. Barbara Webster's leadership role with that group.

Because of the continuing interest on campus in the developing relationships between the Board of Technical and Adult Education and the Board of Regents and among the institutions they represent, I am sharing below a statement of operating philosophy which was approved by the Board of Regents at its February meeting:

Statement of Operating Philosophy

The Board of Technical and Adult Education and the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia believe that the educational interests of the citizens of Georgia can be best served by cooperative efforts between both boards and among the institutions they represent.

The boards and institutions should create a climate which identifies and promotes cooperative efforts, enhances the opportunities for all students to achieve upward mobility and provides options to allow students to reach their maximum potential.

The board and institutions within each system should move toward the development and implementation of plans, policies and procedures relating to course offerings, personnel and facilities which will allow the achievement of these goals. In doing so, utmost concern should be given to minimizing duplication of efforts and to enhancing the cooperative use of the increasingly limited fiscal resources available for meeting the public postsecondary educational needs of the citizens of Georgia.
